



Frequently Asked Questions

How is this opportunity funded?	Because we are an education justice initiative, on average, our College-in-High School Courses cost a reduced \$250 per enrollee . Many states and districts have multiple streams to fund this opportunity. Previous enrollees have used dual enrollment funding, including federal stimulus/American Recovery Plan dollars. Check with your district and state leaders to discuss funding streams.
What school-based supports will students have during the course?	Each participating school should select a Supervising Teacher who will act in a facilitation and coaching role. The course team will provide comprehensive instruction and will grade all student work, but the Supervising Teacher plays a crucial role to support student success.
Can the course count as dual credit?	We recommend offering this course for dual credit — allowing students to earn high-school credit along with college credit from our Consortium of colleges and universities.
When should the course meet?	Participating schools should offer the class as a group experience that meets in a regular class period.

Are there any additional supports for students?	Yes! Through the Ed Equity Lab's partnership with the Common App and others, all students participating in the program receive college advising.

Which students should participate?	This course is recommended for motivated 11th- and 12th-grade students. Exceptions can be made for high-potential 10th- grade students. Ideal students will have the requisite readiness for high-level course work, while also benefiting from the college preparation and credential for college admissions that this experience offers.
When are enrollment fees due?	Fees are typically due 6 weeks after the courses begin.
Are there any additional supports for supervising teachers throughout the semester?	Throughout the semester, your high school supervising teachers supporting your students will be invited to participate in bi-weekly or monthly check-ins to share more information and engage in conversations with other teachers across the country implementing these courses to discuss challenges, highlights, and best practices.
How often does the teacher lead sessions vs. How often does the university faculty?	All sessions are led by students' classroom teachers. As our courses are offered asynchronously, lecture content is prerecorded and uploaded to course sites for student viewing. Some professors have offered the option for students to join live course sessions. Students additionally have support from the University Teaching Fellows, usually on a weekly basis in discussion sections/labs/office hours.
