## **Course Description**

This course will survey Jazz Poetry from the Harlem Renaissance to its present iteration. We will seek to define the genre by analyzing the works of authors such as Jack Kerouac, Sonia Sanchez, Amiri Baraka, and Nathaniel Mackey – as well as music by John Coltrane, Billie Holiday, Geri Allen, Jon Batiste, and others. By the successful completion of this class, students should be able to identify jazz and poetic terms as well as the way they interact to create a jazz poem.

## **Learning Goals**

By the successful completion of this class you should be able to identify poetry, jazz and jazz poetry. Students should have a working knowledge of the development and history of these categories, as well as practice experimenting with one or more of these forms.


